

LCI Float in 2016 Rose Parade

ID Mel Bray and wife, Ginny, were there in person. Per Mel, "The California Lions have had a float in the parade for 22 years. The past few years they have setup packages for Lions to come work on the float and also obtain seats for the parade. We are glad they do this. We signed up right away. worker receives who actually works in some way toward the completion of the float. The LCI float is 35 feet long this year. Next year it is scheduled to be 50 feet long. The middle photo is of Ginny & I standing in front of the very incomplete LCI float with its theme "Camps around the world for all abilities". Our little crew of four cleaned, cut and placed in vials several thousand roses on our work shift. The flower room is about 250 feet long and about 60/70 feet wide, with no heat to keep the flowers from opening too fast before Parade Day."





Two club members -- Harry Pray and Don McClure -- have contributed 95 years in Lions combined and do most of the work in collecting eye glasses for distribution.



<u>The Westmont Club</u> and Foundation have been blessed with the help of several local businesses in recent activities. Dunkin' Donuts Westmont & 1st Colonial Community Bank have given substantial cash donations to help sponsor the Westmont Lions Club 68th Annual Halloween Parade. Dírector's Corner January 2016 Mel Bray, ID 2015-2017



Fellow Lions:

In November we visited in Upstate New York with the Lions of 20W, near the Canadian Border. They said we were lucky because most previous years there had been snow on the Mid-Winter Conference that first week. We were way too late to see the foliage changing colors. The town of Old Forge doesn't have many traffic lights and very few Stop signs either. The greatest number of signs we saw read Snowmobile Crossing and a few said Deer Crossing. The town survives on its water park in the summer months and the snowmobiles later in the winter. Most of the shops and even many of the restaurants were closed for the season. We never did see the WalMart they said was down the road a piece (which was a 357 mile drive one way). What we did have was a group of very dedicated Lions who were brainstorming the question of increasing membership and entertaining the thoughts of redistricting.

Over the first weekend in December Ginny & J visited the lower portion of Delaware in 22D. Each Subdistrict Social (so there are 5 of them) includes all of the District Governors attending. They have a welcome dinner for the International Guests (which happened to be at Jake's Seafood Restaurant where we ate during our own Mid-Winter Weekend last year). On Saturday there was a large banquet and an opportunity to speak to the 150+ Lions in attendance and make a few presentations with the District Governor. The dancing went on to the wee hours along with some singing by the DG's daughter. The most important thing I noticed was what ever this group did, they had way too much fun doing it. Incidentally, I believe I have received one of my most unusual gifts from that DG that I can talk about for a long time. It was a 9+ lb sweet potato about the size of a calf's head. It was guaranteed to be very sweet and totally without the strings found in the usual sweet potato variety we purchase. The DG gives one of these very huge sweet potatoes to each Club President when making his official visit. I guess I will see a lot more unusual things on this journey. In the middle of next month we will be visiting Massachusetts in Woburn with the Lions of Boston and in February we travel to Boise, Idaho. I think the thermals will have to come out of the closet for this one. Who knows, maybe they will hit a high of 72 degrees in the middle of winter for our visit?

I do have to tell you that LCI is very good at pre planning and organizing our meetings and work load. Our next Board meeting begins at the end of February into March. We had to make flight arrangements in OctoberNovember. Two weeks ago, we got our initial packets from LCI to set up our trip to the Board Meeting for June in Fukuoko, Japan prior to the international Convention. Since our last Board Meeting in October, J continue to receive monthly investment reports for review and several other reports and documents for the Finance and Headquarters Operations Committee. The investment reports are over 400 pages each month alone.

In addition, I volunteered to work on an ad hoc committee discussing membership issues specific to North America. This committee has met via teleconference 5 times and developed specific tools for our North American Directors to use on their visits. We will be having our next teleconference on January 3rd (yes it is a Sunday) when the 5 committee members will be presenting our program to all of the sitting Directors and Executive Officers. I think all of the FIDs would agree that while you are on the Board, your time is dictated by the work that is needed to be done and scheduled around the various Executive Officers' schedules and other special meetings or visits.









December 2015 Fellow Lions: As you are aware, I have obtained permission from the Council of Governors to solicit funds for an International Assistance Grant which will be matched by LCIF. The pledges have been coming in slowly, partly due to the Holidays and many clubs not having meetings during the latter part of De-cember. With that in mind, it is necessary to extend the prior deadline for pledges into January 2016. That will necessitate holding up submission of the International Grant Application as well. As of this writing, pledges totaling \$7,400 have been received from the following clubs: Toms River Lions Club, Lakehurst-Manchester Lions Club, Warren Township Lions Club, Toms River Township Visionary Lions Club, Lions District 16L Charitable Foundation and Passaic-Clifton Lions Club. \$900.00 of the pledged funds have already been received with the pledge form. Our goal is to raise \$17,250.00 for our portion of the grant. Currently, we are at 42.28% of our goal. I am asking that if your club is not listed above, please ask your officers and members to consider making a pledge and completing the pledge form that was mailed to every club in Multiple District 16 along with an explanation of what the funds are being used to purchase. Timing for grant submission is becoming a major factor as we do not want to hold up providing eye care for these Kenyan people.


