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# Dírector's Corner November 2015



#### Fellow Lions:

Picking up from my last message, I had to attend an Orientation in Oak Brook, IL, our headquarters, for 4 days. This was to provide the first year directors with an in depth look at each of the departments within the headquarters building. Each of the Division and Department Managers were allotted time to speak in the program and to provide information about the workings of their respective areas. Each day started at 7:45 a.m. getting on the hotel shuttle bus to HQ and then around 5:00 p.m. returning to the hotel, changing clothes and either walking to dinner or hopping on the bus to transport us to dinner. One afternoon, we did have a tour around Chicago and several stops for photo shoots.

We did receive some additional training on the proprietary program used on the iPads through we have to communicate. Fortunately, the iPads are much lighter than lugging around a laptop computer. They are just as versatile as a desktop, but some of the keystrokes are different so that presents a learning curve. All training is, of course, welcomed.

The Orientation did not include our spouses. This allowed the new directors to work on project assignments during the day and to share camaraderie in the evenings. Our North American and Canadian Directors have bonded very well and seem to be working very well together also.

One of the main items we are working on is a long-range plan for the next 5-10 years. We are also discussing a new membership category, which would allow inclusion of specific volunteers who could help on projects. Another topic is what will Lions Clubs look like 25 years from now (no we don't have a crystal ball for this one). We all talk about every year is various issues with membership growth and retention and how we should change the extension process, if at all. Every idea is brought to the floor and discussed with a very broad perspective to reflect our International Membership and some of its unique issues. A major topic is the | 100 Year Anniversary and the Centennial Challenges proposed last year. Here is a place that we can all help. First you can help by conducting a service project in one of the four challenge categories. Then you need to keep accurate records of what was done and how many Lions worked on the project and how many people were served by the project. The most important thing that some clubs are missing is they are not reporting the activity on the club's MyLci Activity report for that month. At present only about 37 % of the clubs are reporting their activities regularly. Some clubs occasionally report and others never report. LCI is actively looking for these reports so they can use the information and numbers in their Public Relations campaigns and new releases. We are the largest service organization in the world and we should be proud to boast our annual contributions to making the World a better place each day, week, month and year. Officers should review the monthly report to ensure your club gets credit for all of the community service that is provided. We do it, so let's get credit for it, around the world.

# Planning & Organizing Seminar





A District 16L GLT Leadership Training Seminar on "Planning & Organizing" took place in Manchester, NJ on Saturday, October 10, 2015 at Unity Hall in Crestwood Village #3, Manchester, NJ. Thirteen Lions were present representing 8 different Lions Clubs. The training facilitator, PDG Rosemarie Townend, a recent Faculty Development Institute graduate, along with GLT District Coordinator, Sarah Taylor-Deak, delivered the Interactive Training Program.

Participants were informed that the training was just a guideline, as people are different, and all tend to work differently. Instructor Townend utilized a bulleted flip chart to outline the details of creating an "Action Plan" that contained planning, organizing, and prioritizing tips. Plus, a mock TO-DO List; a brainstorming activity; and numerous questions afforded the trainees an opportunity to show their comprehension throughout the entire session.

The trainees frequently remarked that it was a pleasure to be actively involved, instead of just sitting, and listening to a lecture. In addition, the participants engaged in a few side conversations which related to the topic, from which all gained new insights. At the end of the presentation, trainees left with many related Lions brochures, handouts, and pamphlets.


All in all, it was a very positive experience.

The **Toms River Club** helped to expand the number of clubs that offer SPOT eye screenings. Moorestown, Maple Shade and Medford Lakes have all had members trained in the use of the SPOT screener. At the end of September, several members of the Sayreville Lions Club were trained in preparation of Sayreville Day. On their first outing, they screened 91 children using their District Eye Mobile. Of the 91 screened, several referrals for complete eye exams were made. Toms River Club will be participating with the Lakehurst-Manchester Lions Club in an eye screening at Lakehurst Veterans Day Celebration on November 12th beginning at 5 p.m. This is a repeat event which began two years ago.

The Toms River Club has been working with the Ocean County Mall going on 9 years. Recently, the club approached them about hanging banners in the mall and asked what such an action would cost? The cost was prohibitive. However, that question quickly lead to the club being asked to participate in the Mall's Kidget Program which had no cost. So far, Toms River has been asked to perform our SPOT eye screenings for the Mall's Annual Health Fair and also their Back to School event. Volunteers came easily from our trained membership and some 40 kids have been screened and several referred for additional check ups with an eye care professional. One of these

events took place coincident with the 16L Reorganization Mtg.

The **Allentown Lions Club** is a vibrant and growing group that has just completed its 75th anniversary. Allentown Lions Club sponsors community events like the White Cane Days, the Art Auction at the German American Club and the introduction of the Craft Beer Garden at the Fall Harvest Fest which have all helped meet the funding the club needs to support the community. As Club President Brian Williams said, "the Craft Beer event was a great success and drew many more folks to the Harvest Fest that would not have come. Hence it's a win for the community as well as win for the fundraising efforts of the club". This year's Craft Beer Garden was at the Allentown Harvest Festival on Saturday October 10 and Sunday October 11th. The club had its annual golf outing at Gamblers Ridge GC in Cream Ridge on Friday October 23rd.

Recently the club honored Kurt Bolz II for his dedicated service to the community at a ceremony on his Birthday. The club was proud of his service to such causes as the Boy Scouts and community activities and he serves as a beacon for others to follow in service to our community.
